Foster youth may be especially at risk for dating violence if they don't have trusted adults to confide in, or if they have never seen healthy behaviors and relationships modeled. PRE-SCHOOL SCRESSING

On Friday, February 14, we attended BPS Pre-School Screening at Rimrock Learning Center, the old Rimrock Elem. School Dist. #2 offers free screening to children in Billings, age 3 - 5. The screening does a couple of things - during the comprehensive testing, they can evaluate readiness for entering kindergarten, and they also evaluate children who fall short in some areas. The testing is done by specialists from the school district: psychologists, speech and language therapists, small and large motor skills, vision, and audiology. The testing is done one-on-one without parents. Testing usually takes a good hour. After the "exit interview" with the parents is where we come in. We are stationed close to that last station so we can catch families as they leave. We thank the kids for working so hard and being so big and brave. All the kids, including siblings, choose one of our very cool books to take home. This screening is offered 4 times a year. The one on Friday was quite low in attendance due to illness and it WAS Valentine's Day! The next one will be April 17.

When we began this project, we worked with Head Start, but they changed their testing technique and only tested new students. We felt that since they didn't have a set schedule, trying to coordinate our time was difficult.

Becky McGill, Bev Silkwood, and I (Sandy Mueller) have been the ones from the BJWC who feel dedicated to this and always look forward to sharing our books with kids.

Bylaws: Preparing for Your Club's Future

Have you recently reviewed your club's Bylaws? If the last time the bylaws of your club were reviewed was a few years ago, there may have been some changes. An annual review of your club's bylaws is important to keep your bylaws relevant. Over the years, times and circumstances may change the structure and requirements of the club. As our organizations grow and mature, revisions to the bylaws should be considered to more accurately reflect the activities of the clubs, the states, and GFWC.

Recent changes within the GFWC Bylaws may also affect a club's bylaws. At the 2019 GFWC Convention, a bylaw amendment was approved to revise the names and number of the Community Service Programs. While this change does not take place until the beginning of the 2020–2022 Administration, your club needs to review its bylaws prior to that time so that the new Community Service Programs can be successfully integrated into your club's program of service. **Effective July 1, 2020, the number of Community Service Programs will change to five and will become the following: Arts and Culture, Civic Engagement and Outreach, Education and Libraries, Environment, and Health and Wellness.**

So be proactive, and review those bylaws soon!
